TAMIAMI AMATEUR RADIO CLUB Minutes of the Meeting 14 December 2011

President Stew Haag-W4MO called the meeting to order at 7:07 PM and, following a flag salute. introductions were made all around.

MINUTES – Secretary Jack Sproat-W4JS requested a motion to accept the minutes of the 09 November 2011 meeting as published in the December 2011 issue of *The Communicator*. Bob Curts-KA9ZAZ so moved, seconded by Dil Kay-W8DIL, and passed.

CORRESPONDENCE – An Orlando Hamcation flyer was received and shown to the members.

TREASURER'S REPORT – Due to the absence of Treasurer Don Jansen-KI4VGE, the Secretary read the Treasurer's Report for November. The starting balance was \$1951.08. Receipts were \$23.00 from the November meeting 50/50, \$200 from dues and an \$22 donation from Russ Peschier-K1WTK, totaling \$245.00. Expenses were \$14.95 for Internet service, \$219.50 for installation of the paving bricks at the repeater tower, and \$5 for the attendance drawing, totaling \$239.45. The ending balance is \$1956.63. Conrad Owens-WA3RRS moved for acceptance of the report, seconded by Ron Hogarth-K4AUX, and passed.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

SUNSHINE – Stew-W4MO stated, correctly, that we are all saddened by the premature and unexpected death of Jon Hamlet-W4ZW on 06 December. Stew called for a moment of silent prayer for Jon.

VE TESTING – At our 10 December VE session, Dave Reed came up from Fort Myers as a civilian and, after one hour of exams, left as an Amateur Extra class licensee.

REPEATER/TECHNICAL – The 146 and 444 MHz repeaters are operational in both analog and digital modes. The remote Flex 3000 is undergoing some maintenance. Anyone wishing to access the Flex needs to contact Stew-W4MO for procedures.

CLUB PROPERTY – The inventory of club property has not changed. Stew commented that all are welcome to look over the items in his garage for any possible interest. He will soon be tossing out those items.

PUBLICITY/MEMBERSHIP – The most recent roster from San Yoder-K3SY shows that we have a total of 72 members, i.e., 60 dues paying members, of which only 23 had paid their 2012

dues, eight Life Members, and four First Year Free Members.

NET OPERATIONS – Stew commented that turnout for our nets remains very poor. A proposal was then given to the members that we discontinue the Tuesday night Simplex Net and replace it with a 70 cm net utilizing our 444.100 MHz repeater. A show of hands indicated that at least eight members present would check into such a net. Fred Lathwood-KJ4TNI moved we initiate such a net on 03 January 2012, seconded by Andy Durette-KB1HIP and passed. Stew advised that the input frequency is 449.100 MHz with 100 Hz PL. Stew still has some 440 radios available for the members.

LIAISON TO QCWA – There were 23 members, spouses and friends present at the 07 December luncheon/meeting of Suncoast Chapter 53. Jack Parsons-K3OTY, assisted by Hans Napfel-WB2ZZB, presented his PP program on Jack's ham shacks, equipment and antennas over the past 56 years. Visitors are welcome to our group the first Wednesday of the month at Denny's on Bee Ridge Road in Sarasota.

OLD BUSINESS – Annual Election: Stew turned the chair over to Conrad Owens-WA3RRS, Chairman of the Nominating Committee. Conrad offered the following slate of those willing to serve:



-- DECEMBER SOLAR ACTIVITY --

Thru 29 December the Solar Flux ranged from 120 to 164, with a mean value of 141.6 (vs. 84.3 for December 2010 and 77.0 for December 2009). Through 28 December the A-index was ≥ 7 on 4 days and the sunspot number ranged from 44 to 185, with a mean of 107.9. Sunspot Regions 1364 to 1390 were active, with 142 C-class and 3 M-class flares occurring.

-- JANUARY FORECAST --

Solar activity is forecast to be at predominantly low levels during January, with a slight chance of isolated M-class flares.

No proton events at geosynchronous orbit are expected. The greater than 2 MeV electron flux

at geosynchronous orbit is expected to be at normal levels during the month. The Solar Flux should average 131 during January.

The geomagnetic field should be quiet with the exception of 01-02 and 05-06 January when quiet to unsettled levels are expected due to recurrent coronal hole high speed streams.

One of the local QRPers came by last week. This well-aged QRPer was a bit restless and we thought we knew the answer. "Been reading 'Silent Keys' in *QST* again?" we asked and the QRPer nodded. After a bit he spoke. "This DXing has always been an unusual thing to me," he said. "A DXer makes an acquaintance that may be thousands of miles away, in another country, and with the odds that most will never meet face to face. Yet there exists a bond and

that feeling of loss when they are no longer with us. Why is that?"

In turn, we held our own silence for the feeling has often come to us also. Finally the QRPer spoke again. "I have long felt that DXers offer what is closer to true friendship than any other activity. We meet another DXer on the air, we give nothing and expect nothing. Only friendship. That and nothing more."

We both were silent for a long time after this, for most DXers do know the feelings and the friendships. The true Internationalists of Amateur Radio are the DXers and their bonds of friendship are far flung.

-- JOHN E. "JON" HAMLET-W4ZW; SK --

At our 14 December meeting, President Stew Haag-W4MO advised all present of the sudden and untimely death of TARC stalwart and past Director Jon Hamlet-W4ZW. None of those who knew Jon can fully understand this loss.

Around 1990 Jon learned the Russian language and went over to Moscow to start up a Radio Shack facility that became more like a current Best Buy store. He witnessed the fall of communism in the Soviet Union and the birth of capitalism in Russia. If you were fortunate, you attended our meeting when Jon gave an indepth overview of his experience over there.

Jon was truly an entrepreneur, and your editor recalls going with Dick Dean (SK) for lunch with Jon and some local QCWA members at a restaurant in North Venice around 1999. There was a beautiful red Ferrari spyder in the parking lot. When that car was commented upon, Jon responded that it was his, but it was a copy of a Ferrari body and built on a Corvette chassis. He had a plant over near Orlando where they made these cars for use in the TV series "Miami Vice." Couldn't have "Sonny Crocket" taking chances with real Ferraris! Excessive environmental regulations led to closure of that plant.

Jon was originally from Kentucky and was first licensed at age 15. Jon operated 99.9% CW; in fact, he dropped the "h" from his name to speed up his CW sending. And he was great; at home in that mode. Operating during our 2010 Special Event Station K4S venture, he rattled off CW QSOs at a rate better than two per minute.



Jon's shack on Casey Key was set up with a multitude of radios, amplifiers and beams on top of his roof. He also had a smaller setup out in Breckenridge, Colorado, up some 10,000' ASL.

With over 14,000 "hits" on this QRZ.com page, you know that Jon was an active ham.

Jon loved to keep on the cutting edge of electronic technology, and would often arrive at a TARC meeting with his latest miniaturized computer. After he had studied the new Windows 7 to his content, he gave a PP presentation of the features of this new Microsoft OS.

The TARC went through a strenuous period several years back. The business acumen of Jon smoothed over the rough spots and got us back on track where we remain to this day.

Jon became devoted to establishing a ham radio club at Pine View School a couple of years ago. Jon developed a training program to assist interested students in getting their Technician licenses. He and some other TARC members devoted countless hours to setting up equipment and getting antennas up on the roof. The W4PVC club station resulted from such efforts.

In a similar manner, Jon and George Becht-N2SQ, Director of the Sarasota Military Academy ham radio club station W4SMA worked together to train a number of students for their Technician licenses. Jon and George developed a very close relationship that endured.



Jon was extremely proud of his SMA-W4SMA golf shirt, and was wearing it when we saw him at the Tampa Bay Hamfest on 03 December. Who could imagine it was to be the last time?

It's obvious that Jon affected many people of all ages and walks of life, an all will have memories of this man.

-- SITE FOR CONTEST DETAILS --

-- FIVE YEARS COMING UP --

February, 2012, will mark the fifth anniversary of the end of Morse code testing for all levels of FCC amateur radio licenses. The final code tests were administered on February 22, 2007 after being a part of U.S. license exams since the inception of amateur radio licensing nearly a century ago. Over the decades, code test speeds rose and fell with changing times. Code testing for the entry-level Technician Class was eliminated in 1991.

Since the end of code testing, the ranks of radio amateurs in the U.S. have increased by nearly 50,000 and many newer hams are learning CW even though it is no longer required. Detailed looks and commentary on the fate of Morse code in the five years since the end of code testing will be published in the February issues of *CQ* and *WorldRadio Online* magazines.

-- MEDICAL DEVICES ON 440 MHZ --

FCC commissioners voted unanimously on 30 November to permit the use of implantable wireless medical devices that operate in spectrum between 413 and 457 MHz. This includes the entire 70-centimeter amateur band (420-450 MHz). These low-power devices, like amateur radio, will have a secondary allocation on the band (federal government radar is primary).

According to the ARRL Letter, Medical Micropower Networks will use multiple transmitters implanted in the body that will use electric currents to activate and monitor nerves and muscles in hopes of restoring mobility and function to people who have lost the use of limbs or organs. While there is little risk of interference to amateur radio from these ultra-low-power networks, there is concern that amateur transmitters may cause interference to these devices (emphasis added). The FCC is expected to issue a Report & Order specifying the new rules for these devices in the near future.
