-- FCC NABS ONE --

Joaquim Barbosa-N2KBJ of Elizabeth, New Jersey must pay \$16,000 for "willfully and repeatedly violating Section 301 of the Communications Act of 1934, as amended by operating a radio transmitting equipment on the frequency 296.550 MHz without Commission authorization."

The FCC noted in the Forfeiture Order that based on the examination process involved in pursuing an amateur license, "amateur licensees are expected to have an understanding of radio operations and pertinent FCC regulations, including Part 97 of the FCC's rules governing the Amateur Radio Service. Licensed amateur operators know that they are authorized to operate only on the frequencies listed in Section 97.301 of the rules, as designated by their operator class and license. Pursuant to the Table of Allocations, the 267-322 MHz band -- the band that Barbosa was operating in -- is allocated solely for federal government use, which we continue to believe Barbosa knew (or should have known) was not authorized for non-government use."

President Fred Lathwood-KJ4TNI called the meeting to order at 7:05 PM and, following a flag salute, introductions were made all around. Steve Lawrence-K9ARH was welcomed as a visitor.

MINUTES – Fred requested a motion to accept the minutes of the 14 November meeting as published in the December issue of *The Communicator*. Guenther Hennig-AJ4QX so moved, seconded by Dil Kay-W8DIL, and passed.

CORRESPONDENCE – The Secretary reported sending a letter of appreciation to the Venice Public Library, transmitting \$54 which was retained from license exam fees during 2012.

TREASURER'S REPORT – Due to the absence of Treasurer Don Jansen-KI4VGE, the Secretary offered the Treasurer's Report for November. The starting balance was \$2499.52. Receipts were \$175.00 from membership dues and \$19.00 from the November meeting 50/50, totaling \$194.00. Expenses were \$11.10 to Birch Communications for Internet service. The ending balance is \$2682.42. San Yoder-K3SY moved for acceptance of the report, seconded by Andy Durette-KB1HIP, and passed.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

SUNSHINE – Stew Haag-W4MO reported that his son Mark and Mark's wife had visited Martin Zippe-AF4ID/DJ6OM while in Munich. Martin was very happy to see them.

VE TESTING – There were no candidates at our 08 December VE session. During 2012, we only examined 18 candidates, quite a decline from previous years.

REPEATER/TECHNICAL – Stew-W4MO reported that the power supply for the repeaters blew out and that he had replaced it, such that both repeaters are operational. Fred-KJ4TNI thanked Stew for his efforts, which was followed by a round of applause.

PUBLICITY/MEMBERSHIP – San Yoder-K3SY advised that we have 60 dues paying member and eight Life Members, for a total of 68 Club members. However, to date only nine members have paid their dues for 2013.

NET OPERATIONS – Jack-W4JS reported that, due to equipment failure, he can no longer serve as a net control for the 440 Net. Jack will ask Charlie Covell-W4DB to be the net control for that net.

LIAISON TO QCWA – There were 29 members, spouses and friends present at the 05 December luncheon of Suncoast Chapter 53 at Denny's on Bee Ridge Road, Sarasota. It was reported that Fred-KJ4TNI had joined the chapter. The program was a PP presentation of the Panama Canal Cruise of Lisa and Hans Napfel-WB2ZZB. All are welcome to join us the first Wednesday of the month around 11:15 AM.

OLD BUSINESS – Nothing carried over.

NEW BUSINESS – <u>Election of 2013 officers</u>. Fred turned the chair over to Andy Durette-KB1HIP, Chairman of the Nominating Committee. Andy read off the candidates, all of whom are incumbents:

-- DECEMBER SOLAR ACTIVITY --

The Solar Flux ranged from 96 to 122, with a mean value of 108.5 (vs. 141.3 for December 2011 and 84.3 for December 2010), and the A-index was \geq 7 on four days. The sunspot number ranged from 23 to 90, with a mean of 60.4. Sunspot Regions 1624 to 1642 were active, with 41 C-class flares.

-- JANUARY FORECAST --

Solar activity is expected to be at low levels during January with a chance of isolated M-class flares during the month.

No proton events are expected at geosynchronous orbit.

The greater than 2 MeV electron flux at geosynchronous orbit is expected to be at background levels throughout the month.

The geomagnetic field may be at predominantly quiet levels with the exception of 01-02, 13 and 28 January when recurrent coronal hole high speed streams are expected to bring unsettled conditions.

The Solar Flux should average 110.5 during January.

-- 2013 LONG RANGE FORECAST --

In his "Propagation" column in the January 2013 issue of CQ, Tomas Hood-NW7US offers the following forecast for 2013 propagation.

10 and 12 Meters: These bands will be good during the DX seasons, but will suffer during the summer, except during times of sporadic-E activity.

15 Meters: This band will be fair to good, seeing worldwide openings during the daylight hours of all seasons.

17 Meters: This band should behave much like 15, but you will find it open more often, remaining open for DX an hour or two longer than 15 meters.

20 Meters: This will be the main player. Expect good conditions during the daylight hours, with worldwide DX openings possible throughout the year. DX will tend to peak for a few hours after local sunrise and again during the sunset period. Look for nighttime DX during the winter.

30 Meters: Will be an exciting band for low-power digital signals.

40, 60, 80 and 160 Meters: Great worldwide DX should continue on 40 from about two hours before sunset to about two hours after sunrise. Coast-to-coast DX on 60 meters. DX on 80 and 160 should peak during early spring, late fall, and winter months. Expect somewhat stronger signals than in the last few years.

-- HOW ABOUT SOME CONTESTING? --

More of our members are getting up some form or other of HF antennas, so perhaps they will take up some interest in contesting.

What do you gain by entering contest? For one thing, they can be very helpful if you are trying to Work All States, or add a "new one" in your quest for DXCC, the most popular award in ham radio.

As you will note from the contest schedules and info in each month's issue, there are some type of contest every weekend of the months. So, why not get involved, even if you only "search and pounce" to make a few contacts. Here are some suggestions to help get you started.

Stay Legal: If you don't have an Amateur Extra class license, make sure that you only look for stations that are in the band segments where you can operate. If you don't already have one,

go to <u>http://www.arrl.org/graphical-frequency-</u> allocations and print out the frequency chart.

Contest Exchange: The "Exchange" column above is pretty straight forward regarding exchanges, but "Grid" may confuse you. This refers to the Maidenhead Grid Locator system. If you look on the "Details" page for your call sign on QRZ.com, you will find your Grid Square.

Logging: Be careful to keep your log book in front of you so that you don't make the error of calling a station that you already worked.

You are not required to submit a log to the contest sponsors. However, in some instances you may be asked via e-mail for a "Check Log" by those who check the logs that were submitted. If you only worked a dozen or so stations and used a paper log, you can scan your log page and send it, or you can type the exchanges into an e-mail.

So, why not try contesting? It's a lotta fun.
