TAMIAMI AMATEUR RADIO CLUB Minutes of the Meeting 13 February 2013

President Fred Lathwood-KJ4TNI called the meeting to order at 7:10 PM and, following a flag salute, introductions were made all around. Allan Culbert-K0AL from Nokomis, FL/Cedar Rapids, IA, and Edith Norby from San Francisco were welcomed as visitors.

MINUTES – Fred requested a motion to accept the minutes of the 09 January meeting as published in the February issue of *The Communicator*. Conrad Owens-WA3RRS so moved, seconded by Jon Donnelly-KY4JD, and passed.

CORRESPONDENCE – The Secretary reported applying for use of the Special Event call sign K4S 12-14 April for the Sharks Tooth Festival, and the application was approved by the ARRL. A notice of this proposed operation was sent to ARRL and CQ Communications for publication in the April issues of *QST* and *CQ*.

TREASURER'S REPORT – Treasurer Don Jansen-KI4VGE read the Treasurer's Report for January. The starting balance was \$2877.32. Receipts were \$610.00 from membership dues and \$21.00 from the January meeting 50/50, totaling \$631.00. Expenses were \$11.10 to Birch Communications for Internet service, \$61.25 for annual renewal of Florida incorporation and \$21.83 for office expenses, totaling \$94.18. The ending balance is \$3414.14. Vic Ouellette-K1CGI moved for acceptance of the report, seconded by Charlie Covell-W4DB, and passed.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

SUNSHINE – It was reported that Life Member Hal Cole-W4GUY passed away on 30 January 2013.

VE TESTING – There was one candidate at our 09 February VE session. A senior at VHS, he got interested on Wednesday, studied some of Thursday and Friday, and missed only two questions for his Technician license.

REPEATER/TECHNICAL –Both repeaters are operational.

PUBLICITY/MEMBERSHIP – San Yoder-K3SY advised that as of 12 February we have 69 members, including seven Life Members, of which 46 have paid their 2013 dues.

NET OPERATIONS – All nets have been averaging about six check ins.

LIAISON TO QCWA – There were 31 members, spouses and friends present at the 06 February luncheon at Denny's on Bee Ridge Road, Sarasota. The program was an excellent PP presentation by Jim Wise-W4PRO describing his

experiences when he operated 7Q7PRO from Malawi last April-May. All are welcome to join us the first Wednesday of the month around 11:15 AM.

OLD BUSINESS – Fred-KJ4TNI asked how many had submitted his "TARC Club Inquiry" and requested that those who had not yet done so to submit it as soon as possible. Fred wants to review the input to best determine members' interests such that appropriate programs and activities can be initiated.

NEW BUSINESS – Fred passed around two forms for members to sign up for participation as monitors for the Sharks Tooth 10-K Run on 13 April and/or operation of K4S from the Sharks Tooth Festival site or from home.

COMMENTS FROM THE FLOOR – Fred asked how many had attended the Orlando Hamcation and was pleasantly surprised by the generous show of hands.

ADJOURNMENT – A motion to adjourn at 7:30 PM was made by Bob Avrutik-N1RA, seconded by Tom Fraser-AK4ZM, and passed. There were 20 members and two visitors present.

PROGRAM – Vic Ouellette-K1CGI presented a very professional program highlighting his bus tour last summer from Chicago to Santa Monica, CA via The Mother Road, US Route 66.

radio operation to spread word about the Festival and its goals. That inquiry proved positive and Special Event station call sign K4S was obtained for use during the 3-day event. The photo on page 1 shows our first operation, by ourselves out on the eastern limit of the grounds.

In the following years the annual K4S operation became internal, alongside organizations such as the Coast Guard Auxiliary. Generally operations were in the 20-meter phone band.

Two years ago the first Sharks Tooth 10-K Run was held and a number of members provided communications as they monitored the course. Last year that run was certified by the USATF and our monitoring more organized.

However, due to heavy local QRM and lack of K4S staffing in 2011, the 2012 operation of K4S took place from the homes of several members on RTTY, PSK31 and SSB.

Several members have offered to put K4S on the air from the festival site and from their home stations. Contact Fred if you're willing to help.

-- FEBRUARY SOLAR ACTIVITY --

The Solar Flux ranged from 95 to 114, with a mean value of 108.7 (vs. 110.8 for February 2012 and 91.0 for February 2011), and the A-index was \geq 7 on seven days. The sunspot number through 27 February ranged from 25 to 117, with a mean of 60.0. Sunspot Regions 1666 to 1683 were active, with one M-class and 31 C-class flares.

-- MARCH FORECAST --

Solar activity is expected to be at very low to low levels during March with a slight chance of M-class flares after 10 March when Region 1675 returns.

No proton events are expected at geosynchronous orbit.

The greater than 2 MeV electron flux at geosynchronous orbit is expected to be normal to moderate levels.

The geomagnetic field should be at mostly quiet levels with the exception of 01 and 21 March when recurrent CH HSS are expected to be geoeffective.

The Solar Flux should range from 95 to 120 and average 103.5 during March.

One of the members of the Florida Contest Group recently asked for the opinion of other members regarding game changing contest and DX radios since 1970, i.e., radios that raised the bar. Keep in mind that the FCG guys are active and they're active at contesting and DXing. In the ARRL CW DX Contest, some members had over 3000 Qs in 48 hours, and many members averaged around 1000 Qs. In other words, the members know and use their radios such that they have real world experience with "what works."

So, what do they consider to be the game changing radios (arranged somewhat in chronological order)?

Signal One CX7 and CX11
Kenwood TS-50, TS930, TS 820S and

Ten-Tec Argonaut and Omni
Yaesu 901 and FT-1000
Elecraft K3

There were various reasons for their selections, such as the Collins KWM-2 being the epitome of the first transceivers, Drake offering great radios at affordable prices, Signal One pioneering digital readouts, etc. Several of the radios mentioned were by manufacturers who no longer serve the amateur radio market, or who have disappeared. But, over the years, they did raise the bar.


