President Konrad Owens-WA3RRS called the meeting to order at 7:05 PM and led the pledge of allegiance. Cullen Murphy-K1IXZ or Venice was welcomed as a new member and Jack Gaddas-KI4ZDP of Venice was welcomed as a visitor. Introductions were then made all around.

Konrad then asked for a Moment of Silence in memory of Jim Halliday-NX2II.

**MINUTES** –Konrad asked for a motion to accept the minutes of the 09 August 2007 meeting as published in the September 2007 issue of *The Communicator*. Peter Pesa-N4RD so moved, seconded by Mike Hickey-NY4P, and passed.

**CORRESPONDENCE** – None received or sent during the month.

TREASURER'S REPORT – Treasurer Don Gray-WD7A reported that the 09 August starting balance was \$4022.51. Receipts were \$13.00 from the August 50/50 drawing, \$50.00 from sale of club items, and \$8.00 from new member dues, totaling \$71.00. Expenses were \$3.45 for newsletter printing, \$32.95 for a General Class License Manual, \$123.00 for books for the Venice Public Library and future training courses, \$8.03 for engraving Silent Key plate for NX2II, and \$21.75 for new member call sign badges, totaling \$189.16. The 13 September ending balance is \$3904.35. Stew Haag-W4MO moved acceptance of the report, seconded by Peter Pesa-N4RD, and passed.

**CLUB PROPERTY** – Ed Holt-K2SCQ had donated a KDK 2-meter radio, a Radio Shack power supply and miscellaneous items to the club.

**PUBLICITY/MEMBERSHIP** – Don Gray-WD7A reported that we now have 77 members. This includes five Life Members and six first year free members.

**NET OPERATIONS** – Konrad reminded all of our two weekly 2-meter nets, and our Tuesday and Friday breakfasts.

**OLD BUSINESS** – Discussion was held regarding several pending items:

- Emergency Generator Stew-W4MO reported that the engine specs have been given to Calkins LP Gas Co. in Englewood to determine the cost of conversion from gasoline to LPG fuel. Labor could range from 1 to 8 hours. Keith Calkins has advised that the use of manifolded 30# LPG tanks would not provide a reliable fuel supply and recommended use of an above ground storage tank. As the \$500 previously approved for this conversion may prove inadequate, Mike Hickey-NY4P moved allocation of an additional \$100, seconded by Peter Pesa-N4RD, and passed.



Solar Flux and K-index varied in accordance with NOAA 27-day forecast.

#### -- SEPTEMBER SOLAR ACTIVITY --

During September, the Solar Flux ranged from 65 to 71, with a mean value of 67.1 (vs. 75.4 for September 2006 and 90.8 for September 2005). The Aindex was  $\leq$  10 on 18 days.

Recurrent coronal hole high speed streams caused active geomagnetic conditions 01-03, unsettled to active levels 05-07, quiet conditions 08-19, quiet to active 20-23, unsettled to quiet 24-26, and unsettled to minor storm levels 27-30 September.

#### -- OCTOBER FORECAST --

During December, solar activity is expected to be very low. No proton events are expected. The greater than 2 MeV electron flux at geosynchronous orbit is expected reach high levels 01-10 October and again 21-22 October. The solar flux should remain around 67-68 during October.

Geomagnetic activity is expected to be quiet to unsettled 01-02 October, increasing to unsettled to active 03-04 October due to recurrent coronal hole HHS. Quiet conditions are expected 05-16 October, increasing to quiet to unsettled levels 17-19 October. After unsettled to active levels on 20 October, activity is expected to decrease to quiet to unsettled through the 25th, unsettled to active on the 26th, decreasing to quiet 28-29, and unsettled to active 30-31 October.

Even if you are only into casual DXing, this is also a good time to see how your station competes against others. Keep in mind that even a marginal station will often enjoy better propagation conditions than others may, so don't be bashful about getting into this contest. Log submittal is optional; not required.

## --W4JS TOWER PROJECT --

The 70' tower is up, so the next stage involved the connection of the coaxial and rotator control cables. Following the same approach as with the 60' Aluma tower, lightning arrestors were installed in a surplus ammunition can. The first photo shows the arrestor installation and the remote antenna switch mounted on the tower. The 0.590" diameter LMR600 coax enters and leaves the suppressor box, and will connect to the SteppIR beam (once it arrives and is assembled and mounted). The 0.405" diameter LMR400 coax on the tower leg from the 40-meter beam enters and leaves the suppressor box and goes to the antenna switch. The other LMR400 from the antenna switch goes to the Hygain TH11DX beam on the Aluma tower, some 130' to the south.



Interior view of lightning suppressors mounted on a Harger copper plate. The copper plate is bonded with two 1.5" copper straps to the adjacent tower legs and ground rods. The top suppressor is for the antenna rotator, with two coaxial cable suppressors immediately below. All suppressors are from Industrial Communications Engineers, Ltd. (I.C.E.).




Lightning protection is mandatory in this area, therefore, serious effort was put into developing an

acceptable tower grounding system. A total of sixteen 10' copper pipes, four 8' galvanized ground rods, and some 280' of 1.5" copper strap were used. All guy wires were bonded together and grounded, and connection was made to the electrical and telephone service grounds. Below is a typical ground rod connection, utilizing Polyphaser hardware.
