Summertime Fun: Time to check your antenna/coax?

Besides being a good time to chase DX, one of the best things you can do in the summer months to increase your DX totals is check your antennas! Lower that dipole or that beam and check the coax connection to the balun or the insulator. Check the condition of the coax. Check the connection to the shack equipment it connects to. Consider replacing that 100' of RG58 with RG8 or equivalent. It will increase the power delivered to the antenna. As we say up north, do it before winter sets in. Hi hi.

Question of the Month for May 2024...How high is your DX IQ?

When I took over this column in November 2022, my first column included a list of things serious DXers do. If you've been reading this column since then you know that it has provided info on each of the listed items. Done well with DX since then? Need a refresher? Check yourself against the list again:

I use ARRL's Logbook of the World I use a DX Cluster to check for DX spots. check the SFI, and more I can make QSOs in CW, SSB, Digital I *Listen* before I call a DX station I check the bands at gray-line UTC, both morning and evening I check into DX nets I know how to use ClubLog and OQRS I regularly check NG3K's website for Announced DX Operations, contest info, and more I use my radios signal processor to make my signal stand out I use Split operation when directed

We all go to (or read about) the many events that TARC hosts or participates in. But I bet most of you never think about all the radio equipment, the popup tent, the cables, the antennas, miles of feedline, tables, signs, chairs, and everything else it takes to hold an event. You show up, it's there, you go home after a great time with fellow hams, at a VERY well-equipped Club. TARC maintains a large storage unit in a temperature controlled facility here in Venice (at a considerable but necessary yearly expense). All of this equipment MUST be accounted for. We have a LOT of money invested in these assets and rely on them not just for our fun events, but this equipment is what we deploy in the event TARC is called upon for supporting an Emergency in the community.

Rich MacCredy, KQ4AHZ is the TARC Quartermaster. He took over the daunting role back in early 2023. He and I share a similar background in EMS (Emergency Medical Services) so we usually are found at the same end of the Perkins tables on Fridays swapping war-stories. and nerding-out about barcode labels and clipboards. Rich has a fascinating career history, which you can read about below. I will say, and I mean this as a compliment, he should apply for the vanity Callsign <u>KQ4OCD</u>. He has taken over his role with gusto. There is a level of organization that befits, well, a Military unit. Things are clean, organized, labled, inventoried, and secure.

Rich was featured in a recent edition of *The GP Responder* which is a publication of the Gran Paradiso CERT Team and he has provided me with this biopic.

Richard MacCready retired from the CIA after 37 years in communications, soft-ware engineering, Presidential communications, Emergency Management and IT program management. After retirement he spent another three years supporting the CIA through contracting efforts in both the IT and medical areas. Mr. MacCready also has 25 years of operational experience with Sterling Volunteer Rescue Squad in Loudoun VA as an Advanced Life Support (ALS) provider. Of special note is his leadership of a volunteer programming effort that replaced the County's outdated pager system with a more cost effective, phone text-based system saving the county the EMS and CERT arenas.

Mr. MacCready taught Emergency Medical Services classes for 16 years at the Northern Virginia (VA)

Community College in Springfield, Virginia. He also taught similar classes for the Loudoun County Fire and Rescue Academy in Leesburg, VA for 10 years. Throughout his EMS career, he often served as an EMS certifica-tion evaluator for the Commonwealth of Virginia. Mr. MacCready moved to Gran Paradiso in June 2020 and immediately joined the CERT effort. He has taken an active role in helping the GP-CERT run its training and practice drills as well as working to document lessons learned and managing the GP-CERT communications. Mr. MacCready has a Technician-level amateur radio cer-tification and is a member of the Tamiami Amateur Radio Club, where he recently accepted the role of Quarter-master. Mr. MacCready recently accepted the role as President of the SRQ CERT Association, an organization with the charter to provide CERT based training and standard communications to the CERT teams of Sarasota County.

CQ THE FEST... TARC Has A Very Successful Showing For The 2024 Venice Shark's Tooth Festival

It felt good to "be home" again! TARC has operated a K4S Special Event Station at the Venice Shark's Tooth Festival (STF) since 2005 (except for the Covid years; 2020-22). Last year we operated dispersed from home QTH stations since the new venue in Centennial Park was of concern for effective amateur radio operations. This year we returned to the festival grounds and had a very successful operation with 354 QSO's logged on USB, 40 logged on FT8, and many dozens of contacts made on DMR. Yes, DMR! Dwight KT4DDS suggested trying this since we did have some concerns about RFI at the downtown Venice location and it turned out to be a big hit with the festival goers listening to all the DX coming over that radio on Saturday during the world-wide chat net!

We did miss having Frank W2XYZ as the planner and manager for the event. Frank has been doing this and most of the other club events (winter/summer field day, FL QSO party, etc.) for the past 7 years. His recent illness and expected long recovery time has temporarily sidelined him. Steve, NS4P stepped up and he did a fantastic job for getting our K4S station resourced, staffed, and operating for the event. Thank you Steve!

Another special thank you goes out to Dwight KT4DDS for his role in organizing and promoting the event, and in greeting the public during the event. Dwight suggested TARC's membership in the Venice Mainstreet Association last year for a cost of \$125 a year as a way to promote the club and to recruit new hams. This year that membership paid off with a free (\$600 value) 10x10 foot tent space in Centennial Park for the STF!

Setup began late on Friday afternoon with John N3PQD, Jim KJ4NDO, Paul KN4BAR, and Steve NS4P meeting at the club's storage facility (Cube Smart on Executive Dr.) to load up club equipment for the event. The team reassembled at Centennial Park and was joined by Dwight KT4DDS where the tent and antennas were setup and everything was tested and made ready for the weekend event. Available space for an antenna limited us to one HF station so having a multi-band antenna was a necessity. We used the club's Buddi-Hex antenna and it performed very well making the setup time for the antenna a worthwhile effort.

We had no shortage of volunteer operators for the event with help from Phil KD8HTS, Roger KY4RS, Mark KQ4EKK, Roger N9RM, Andy KB1HIP, Jim KJ4NDO, Steve NS4P, and Dave KQ4IOI. Saturday started off great with a low noise floor and plenty of contacts being made. And then, the band started playing. We aren't sure if it was a generator or some of the amplifier gear, but suddenly we had an S-8/9 broadband noise. Switching to 10 meters helped a little but not much. Steve came to the rescue placing an RF choke on the feedline to minimize the noise greatly; but making contacts with weak stations was still difficult.

Perhaps the most interesting and noteworthy thing to happen during the STF was a third party QSO that was unplanned and surprised everyone. Steve was operating when a father and son duo stopped by to talk with us. The father said his dad was an active ham and after some conversation he asked if we could talk to him? Well, the father texted his father in Norway, Maine and gave him the frequency and K4S call sign of our station. Lo and behold the grandfather was on the radio calling K4S! Steve put the grandson on the radio and he had a QSO with his grandpa from the STF courtesy of TARC. Outstanding!!

Dwight and Tom K7ONE stayed busy during the STF greeting the public and answering their questions about amateur radio. We had a number of visitors walk away with club brochures and promises of looking into getting licensed. We even had a few "old" hams stop by asking if they were still active or how they could get their licenses renewed. STF, getting to meet the public and raise awareness of amateur radio was perhaps the most rewarding aspect of our participation in this event.

Overseeing the return of club equipment to the storage facility was our club Quartermaster, Richard KK4AHZ who made sure everything was complete, clean, and put it the right place so it would be ready for the next time.

On Sunday as we were taking everything down and loading it up for return to the storage facility, Roger KY4RS commented that we have a remote HF station at the repeater site in Englewood and he asked why we didn't consider using that to beat the RFI issue we had at Centennial Park. I think someone else may have brought up that idea at a club meeting a few months ago too; but we had all forgotten about that. Next year, our planning for the STF should include having access to the remote HF station for sure! Not only could that solve the RFI issue if/when it occurs; but it would be yet another demonstration of amateur radio capability and utility.

Gee; I can't' wait until next year! Bigger, better, more stations and more Qs. Thanks to everyone who participated in making this such a fun and successful club event. It could not have happened without you.















FLORIDA QSO PARTY-NOT!



On April 6th and 7th, 2024, Florida State Parks on the Air (flspota.org sponsored by the Lakeland Amateur Radio Club LARC) held a contest. The goal was to acquire points by making contacts to and from Florida State Parks and other stations anywhere. I thought this would be interesting and generally difficult. And, I will explain why.

The way the point system was structured, you get point multipliers for each different FL State Park you activate. You also get point multipliers for each FL State Park that you contact. There is a bonus point structure as well and a myriad of other confusing point scoring rules that a HAM University PHD candidate is currently writing a thesis on (good luck!).

In the end, basically, get out there, make contacts, log them and most importantly HAVE FUN enjoying the outdoors.

Challenge accepted.

I have a bunch of different POTA setups and felt that I was ready to hit the road, but where do I go? Well, the simple answer is to any FL State Park that is on the list. These turned out to be basically the same FL State Parks that reside on the "POTA" list. OK, so anywhere in FL works.

Now to figure out where I will not bump into other operators AND where I have the best opportunity to actually contact other FL State Parks.

My answer was that I needed a vacation (from trying to figure out the rules). I have a friend that is studying for his Tech license, and he has never seen firsthand HF operations AND he has a place in Key Largo, FL. He was excited and wanted to help and watch and learn (I should have gotten bonus points for introducing a new HAM, but no that didn't exist in the "Rules").

With this, I now had a new home base for travel to all the parks in the Florida Keys. There are a whole bunch of them down there including trails, offshore islands, historical sites, botanical parks, a military fort, and one even parks that are 100% underwater. I figured being so far south in FL would give me the best chance to get some of the northern parks in FL. I was only operating SSB and did not want to do any digital, which




Continuing Mark Leber KQ4EKK's account of the most bestest POTA you've ever heard of...

Drawing up a possible 2-day itinerary, I ended up with a total of 8 valid FL parks, trails, sites, etc. Possible, but very tight scheduling for the allowed operating hours of the contest and park closing times. In the end I was able to activate 4 of the 8 on my list and got quite a bit of windshield time in between.

My 2-day contest rewarded me with 4 new activated parks, 80 QSOs, an infinite number of beautiful views, many hours of fun with my buddy Bob Brockway and a 7-day vacation. While the contest may have been over on Sunday evening, it did not stop me from returning to several of the other parks available to me while still in the area. I activated 2 more parks with 99 additional QSOs. Conditions were so perfect one morning, that I had a run rate of 58 QSOs in 62 minutes with contacts from all corners of the US and Canada. Bob and I also grabbed some maps, antenna parts and jumped aboard his boat as we made plans for future expeditions in the Keys. We plan on activating several island parks, San Pedro Underwater Archaeological Preserve State Park, and several National Parks only accessible via boat. Maybe some fishing and scuba diving will fall on the schedule as well.

Points don't matter. Fun in the sun, friendship, sharing, helping are my reward. NO certificate needed.

Everything is NOT "(O) K" Anymore... POTA PARK IDENTIFIER CHANGES

The POTA organization has recently made a significant change to the Park Numbering system. In the past, parks in the United States were identified with a 4-digit number, with a Prefix of "K".

POTA popularity has exploded, since the time of COVID-19 when we needed to stay away from each other, as well as the proliferation of available resources on YouTube, in QST, and other sources displaying it live, and how much fun you can have getting out in the fresh air and playing radio.

Because of this, POTA interest and participation has surged on an *International* level and quite frankly, they were running out of numbers, and the prefixes were confusing. Canadian parks had the prefix of VE (just like their callsigns) but the US was "K" which does not seem to have any direct correlation.

So, the US parks will now have the prefix "US" (go figure!) and Canadian parks have CA.


It is certainly possible to activate or hunt with POTA in DX so other countries have been aligned with a more straightforward nomenclature as well.

HAMCLOCK IN YOUR BROWSER

IF you are running this amazing program on a Raspberry Pi or Inovato Quadra, here is a neat way to view it simultane-



ously in a browser window on any device on your network. (Note, this requires you to know how to get into the file directory of the device to type in a simple line of instructions)

FIRST. Navigate into the device using SSH or FTP.

The command you will enter can go in the root directory.

NOW, Type sudo apt install lighttpd and hit Enter.

YOU will see that the device will fetch and install a small program. AT this point, REBOOT the device. When it restarts, take note of the IP Address of your Pi or Quadra. Hint: It's right there under your callsign!

At this point, you should be able to open a browser (I have used it on Firefox for PC, and Safari on my iphone) Type http://<device IP address>:8081/live.html (do not type the < or >, just the address, for example 192.168.0.42

You can actually USE the clock, not just view it. Select DX locations, change settings, and most other functions are available!

SERIOUS BUSINESS...What's going on around here?

YARN (Yet Another Radio Net) Months ago, the Board approved a request from Tom Waters, KE4RXM to operate a Trader's Net on the 146.805 2m repeater. The net, which Tom calls the *Tamiami Tradeshow* debuted in April. It is similar in format to the other local trading nets hosted by the SERC in Sarasota, and MARCI in Bradenton. The Tamiami Tradeshow is on Tuesday nights at 8pm. One thing that sets this net apart from others is that on Tuesday May 7th, Tom will launch a <u>Companion</u> Website, www.tamiamitradeshow.net where items currently available in the local area will be featured. You can view a person's listings and contact them directly. Any ham is welcome to submit listings online or on the air. This is NOT a commercial endeavor; Tom just really enjoys talking gear, and helping match buyers and sellers. All members, and any other Ham is encouraged to tune in, check in, and support the net. Additionally, the net fully supports a little tech-talk, so if you have a question about a piece of gear, feel free to bring it to the "Show" on Tuesday nights.

Repeater Update On Monday, April 29 John Chaput - KK4LI, owner of JC Tower Services, came over from Lake Placid to make some temporary repairs on the 2-Meter antenna at the Englewood repeater site. You may recall that the antenna was bent in Hurricane Ian, and had recently come loose in its mount, causing it to "weathervane" in strong winds. To mitigate the risk of the antenna falling off its mount, and to prevent damage to the feedline, the club decided to make temporary repairs to the current antenna.

John was able to secure the antenna in a near-vertical position and inspected all the hardware at the top of the tower. John reported that the tower is in very good condition. While he was up on the tower, John was also able to replace a malfunctioning AREDN WiFi transceiver, restoring the TARC mesh WiFi system to full capability.

The club has ordered a new 2-Meter antenna to replace the damaged antenna, using the insurance money we received after Ian, and some of the reserve funds the club keeps for repeater repairs. We expect the antenna to be delivered within a month, at which time we will arrange for John to come back and install it. The inspections John did on this trip will make the installation of the new antenna go smoothly. 73 Steve Phillips
