


Ham Radio Day at the Library

Ham Radio Day at the Library

October 14, 2023 - Sunshine was the order of the day for TARC's first Ham Radio Day at the Library event at the William H. Jervey Library in Venice. TARC setup volunteers arrived at 7:30 AM and by 7:45 AM we were hard at work unpacking and setting up our tents and radio stations. By 9:13 we had everything assembled and ready to run, but there was a problem.

The generator we were to use that day was running but not fast enough to produce the power that was needed. But Bob Schneider, W5GJ, had brought a battery with him that was used to power the CW station until it ran out of juice just before the replacement generator arrived. Once the generator was in place the stations ran flawlessly for the rest of the day.

We learned a lot from this experience. It was not like Field Day because we only had 2 ½ hours for setup. This was more like having to assemble an emergency station on the site of a disaster with no time to lose. And we passed that test.

Club participation for this event was outstanding. We had 15 members for setup, plenty of operators and loggers to keep both stations on the air throughout the day, and at least 12 people for teardown.

Our operators were competing with Pota and Vota stations for activity. Both 15 and 20 meters were busy all day and there was a lot of QRM on adjacent frequencies. We wound up with 32 CW contacts and 39 SSB contacts. So, the next time we do this type of event we will have two generators and amplifiers for the stations.

The best thing that came out of the day was the fact that there is still a great deal of interest in ham radio. I spoke at some length with two individuals, one who listens to short wave radio and the other a lady whose father was a ham. The SWLer was more than eager to get a tech license and get on the air. I sent them both into the library to look for Technician exam books and I expect we will see both of them in the near future at a VE session.

There were others as well. One said he had once been a ham and wanted to get back into it, and some others who were entering or exiting the library, saw our tents, and stopped by.

So, a good time was had by all. I would like to do another event like it in the future perhaps in conjunction with a school affair or maybe a scouting event. What better way for a scout to get a Ham Radio merit badge? Suggestions would be appreciated.

New ARRL Foundation Grant Recipients

Following the June 2023 grant submission period, the ARAL Foundation Board of Directors voted to approve funding for six grant proposals.

ARRL Grant Recipients

The Cleveland County Hamsters in New Edinburg, Arkansas, received a \$1,430 award for their project, Hamsters Teach Radio! The Hamsters will hold at least 10 classes in their county to expose students to amateur radio using hands-on demonstrations, equipment, and online resources.

The Meriden Amateur Radio Club in Meriden, Connecticut, received more than \$1,000 to bring experienced and newer hams together through five balloon launches that will utilize WSPR technology to return tracking and data from additional sensors.

A \$3,000 award was given to Rocky Mountain Ham Radio, serv-



ing Colorado and New Mexico, to ensure that New Mexico's largest hamfest could resume after a 4-year hiatus. The club is enthusiastic that this event will rally the New Mexico amateur radio community and enhance and advance the hobby and service of amateur radio.

The San Angelo Amateur Radio Club in San Angelo, Texas, received 10 ARRL Ham Radio License Manuals to support the club's efforts to provide opportunities to individuals interested in obtaining their Technician license, by partnering with mentors to prepare for the exam.

Forty-five ARAL-published amateur radio books and manuals were awarded to the Tamiami Amateur Radio Club in Nokomis, Florida. These books and manuals will update and expand the number of amateur radio resources available inthe Sarasota County, Florida, library systems.

The Yavapai Amateur Radio Club in Prescott, Arizona, received 20 ARRL Ham Radio License Manuals and ARRL General Class License Manuas to expand their training and testing program. The club estimates that they will be able to license more than 75 new hams in the coming year.

Honey, its way too early to put up the Christmas decorations. Heck, its too early to even think about it yet.


Not so for the 2024 TARC BBQQ. We are jumping right on it and going to lock it down early with the expectation of putting together another great event.

If you forgot or are new TARC members, BBQQ is an acronym for BarBeQue and Qso. The QSO part has to do with the W4AC POTA station we set up. Assuming we get access to a state park as we did last year, we'll have an official POTA operation. If not, we'll operate semi-POTA!!

The first annual BBQQ in March 2023 was estimated to sell 40 'plates'. Over 80 were sold with over 70 actual attendees. Super turnout for a first-time event. There's been pent up demand for a BBQ for years.

So, by popular demand we are going to do it again. Here's the outline:

- The date is not set although late March 2024 looks likely
- The price is not set but \$11-12 per plate looks likely

Ten-Ten@TARC

As we are all gleefully aware, 10m has opened up. I never did any HF in my past ham life so now I've been poking holes in the air with my antenna and seeing what I can see (hear). I have a great rig and no mic fright so may as well give it a go.

One day, I had a QSO that was a 2-fer, or a 2nd Operator and as the first one closed out, he asked if I had a Ten-Ten number. I do not, and didn't evenknow what it was. I politely took their numbers, made notes, lost the notes, and moved on.

I am now co-Net Control, for the 2m chat net, alongside Steve, KN4NFX and when I host, I pre-plan a Question of the Night because I (hope) think it instills interest and engagement. During a net in September, I threw out the question "Do you have a Ten Ten number?" and gave a brief explanation for the uninitiated, as to what it is. The still on-going response was 100% "YES, or NO, but I want one. What is it?".

TEN-TEN International, NET, INC. as it is formally called, was started by a group of Southern California Hams who, back in the early 60's were concerned. The bands had been good, but waning. Interest in the 10m band specifically had been up and down. There was a fear that the Amateur Radio service could *loose* the band if the FCC didn't feel it was being utilized or appreciated. (Hello 1.25m?). They put their brains and pens together and decided to meet ON AIR, at 1800z, on 28.3800 and 28.800mhz "every day, but NEVER on Sunday" with the intent of proving the band was used. Proliferate the hobby. Grow membership and interest.

Well, it worked. I don't know the number of licensed amateur radio operators Worldwide at the time, but by 1975, there were 10,000 members! That is staggering, and the number is over 75k today.

IT's All About The Number...

The way a ham becomes a member is the ultimate pyramid scheme. An operator works the 10m band and makes QSOs. And as s/he does, asks if the other party has a Ten-Ten number. If one of them does, they make sure to log the QSO, and the "hunter" gets the Ten-Ten number of the other operator. Once the prospective member has 10 Ten-Ten numbers, they submit their log, which is part of the membership application, along with the membership fee. The folks at Ten-Ten will verify the numbers and send out a membership packet, containing the new member's Ten-Ten number.

So, Now What?

Your number is yours. For life. Even in /sk, you're still a Marine, Eagle Scout, Ten-Ten member, etc. After you have your number, you can choose whether to just "ride along" giving it out and/or collecting others' numbers, or, if you continue to pay dues after the initial period., you can "chase paper". Ten-Ten has LOTS of milestones, BARS, awards, contests, and the like. It is highly competitive for those who make it their passion.

DO Get Caught In The Net.

There are NETS! NETS Galore! The original net still operates. Every day, but NEVER on Sunday, as the founders decreed. There are 200+ Chapters around the World, many who run regular nets. And QSO parties. And everything else ham. But all on 10m.

What's Going On Here?

Because there was so much interest, the Club will be officially supporting member interest in several ways.


- Number Hunt Net During one of our regular 10m Chat Nets we will organize a membership drive so that anyone looking to fill their log and submit an application for membership can collect the required 10 numbers from within the membership. There are already over a dozen members who have submitted their Ten-Ten number to me. Depending upon the number of participants, this may require more than 1 Net session. And NO, we can't just do it on the 2m net. That would be cheating. But YES, If I am 2m NCS that night, it will be a very short chat net, to give time to the membership drive on 10m.
- **Technician Jump-Start** I am a big proponent of getting Technicians on HF. Techs DO have privileges, including Voice/SSB on 10m. It all comes together nicely. Encouraging and in-person mentoring of a Tech on a radio (yours, theirs, the Club remote station) and attempting to get their Ten-Ten number. It could be very rewarding for both parties.
- TEN-TEN@TARC I will endeavor to start and maintain a roster of numbers, and keep abreast of happenings at the National and International level that may be of interest. If we can integrate a QSO party or contest or whatever comes along into our already active and engaging programs, I'll hope to insert it. Also to be discussed will be regularly scheduled number-drives, mini-nets, etc on a quarterly or semi-annual basis.

The Nitty Gritty – Dues are \$10 a year, or \$25 for 3 years. You get your initial membership materials in the mail. All further communications are done via email, *except* award certificates, and other such documents. Remember, you can stop paying dues, continue to exchange your number. and just come along with us if you don't care to "contest".

TARC as a Club has pledged it's full support of Ten-Ten activities. I believe they see what I see, which is an opportunity to get and keep members engaged in a flexible yet fun side-game. I urge everyone to participate at least in this initial drive. It would be great to write in to the Organization and tell them all about the great success here at TARC.

TEN-TEN at TARC

A small group of Amateur operators in Southern California formed the Ten-Ten International Net, Inc. in 1962, to promote good operating practices, as well as proliferate the hobby and it's usage of the 10m band. The net began operating by meeting Monday thru Saturday, at 10 am (1800 UTC). It still does, 61 years later.

The tenant of membership was decided upon as such; A prospective new member must communicate with 10 existing members, obtain those operator's Ten-Ten number, and then submit their log.

Thirteen years later, there were over 10,000 numbers issued world-wide. It is over 75,000 today!

WHAT'S IT ALL ABOUT?

Your membership is as active as you want to be. You will receive a number. Then, you can:

- -Actively seek/exchange numbers with other members or prospective members on the 10m band.
- -Check in to the National and/or Chapter nets on the air, which occur daily on published schedules.
- -You can "Paper Chase" which means working towards the many International and Chapter- awards and events.
- -Get "BARS" which are awarded at specific QSO number levels (1 bar at 500 QSO's etc.)
- -Participate in a Chapter and organize events, Elmer or Mentor others, etc.

OR, just *Ride Along*, give out our number if asked, and know you're part of the club.

You must continue to pay dues to participate in any BAR levels, awards, contests, etc. However, you can continue to swap numbers (Or give yours to new membership seekers) after your initial membership period, for life.

HOW MUCH DOES IT COST?

\$10 Dues can be paid yearly or \$25 for 3 years. This is the "Electronic" rate where most communications are via email. If you want paper mailed copies of the quarterly newsletter, that is an option. There are no employees, salaries, or commercial interests associated with Ten-Ten International, Inc.

HOW DO I GET STARTED?

The membership application is attached. You will fill out your personal information, as well as the log for your first 10 contacts which is what it takes to become a member. Once your log is complete, you will mail it in and your number along with membership materials will be sent back to you.

An excerpt:

"Ten meters had been roaring during the fifties. Then came the sixties and with it a bad case of the doldrums. Lack of good propagation, and the resulting lack of interest, caused many amateurs to abandon ten meters for greener pastures. This mass exodus from the band was cause for concern on the part of a lot of ten meter enthusiasts, for fear that this lack of activity might cause the FCC to consider reassigning this portion of the radio frequency spectrum to some other service. Sometime in 1961, Irv Hunter, K6PWO, started talking about forming an amateur radio organization to promote activity and every day use of the ten meter band. In March of 1962 word got around that a meeting would take place at the San Dimas Canyon Park, near Irv's home in Glendora, for the purpose of forming such an organization. A picnic lunch was held on a Saturday and several hams from that local area attended....and thus the seed was planted.

It was decided by this small group of stalwarts that the net would meet every day of the week except Sunday at "10:00 am local time...or 1800 UTC. (Aha, 'see you on Ten at Ten'...a natural')". So the name quickly became "10-10 Net". The frequency of 28.800 MHz was chosen as the primary daytime net frequency. "

These Nets still run, daily, all over the world. Here is a sample of a daily schedule:
